Environmental Initiatives Grant Program 2012 Grant Recipients

Ten environmentally based projects and programs are going ahead in 2012 thanks to City of St. Albert's grants of up to \$5,000 in the 2012 annual Environmental Initiatives Grant Program. The Environmental Initiatives Grant Program was made possible by funding received from City of St. Albert to assist community groups in defraying costs associated with environmental projects and programs that are supportive of the City of St. Albert's environmental policy, plans, or practices.

2012 Highlights of the Environmental Initiatives Grant Program:

- 10 applications approved
- Grants awarded ranged from \$92.40 to \$5,000 for each project
- Total grant amount of \$22,219.90
- Applications and grant recipients were from local schools, a post-secondary institution, and community environmental groups.

To be *eligible applicants* had to be a federally or provincially registered non-profit society or charitable organization operating in St. Albert; a school located in St. Albert; or a community group of two or more St. Albert citizens who have come together for the purpose of undertaking an eligible project.

The *eligible project* had to demonstrate environmental benefits or improvements and is consistent with City policies, and may include:

- 1. community environmental education projects;
- 2. open space and natural area enhancement projects;
- 3. natural spaces reclamation projects;
- 4. waste reduction projects;
- 5. wildlife or biodiversity-oriented projects;
- 6. land, air and/or water quality preservation and/or enhancement:
- 7. environmental demonstration projects using innovative technologies;
- 8. environmental projects that demonstrate local, regional or provincial leadership;
- 9. environmental communications and public awareness facilitation projects;
- 10. environmental monitoring or inventory projects; or
- 11. other environmental projects in keeping with City policies.
