John worked for the Town of St. Albert and he hauled ice for homes and businesses from Lac Ste. Anne to St. Albert using horse and wagon. Belcourt-Callihoo, Victoria	Victoria lived her 104 years in the St. Albert/Lac Ste. Anne area. She married Louis Jerome Callihoo and together they raised 12 children. She freighted for the Hudson's Bay Company between Edmonton and Athabasca Landing, and she saw the introduction of currency take over from fur bartering. At the age of 91, she dictated her memories of the 19th-centurey Metis daily life and customs into English and published several articles in the <i>Albert Historical Review</i> .		Dec 2018

Blowey, Fresno and Gladys	Fresno Blowey bought a farm around 1920. During the harvest of 1925, he slipped and badly cu his shoulder on a threshing machine. Gladys was his nurse at The Royal Alexandra Hospital. They were married shortly after and had three children.		2015
Bolduc, Johnny	Johnny was an only child raised at the Grey Nuns' Orphanage following the death of his parents. Went into partnership with Joseph Jacobs on a 240-acre farm.		2015

Borle brothers	Alberic, Cyril, and Prudent Borle came to the Ray district as children in 1897. All 3 brothers were married and farmed in the area, assisted by their Belgian father to get established. There are still Borle descendants in St. Albert.		2015

Edmond was a scout in the American Civil War and panned for gold in California before coming to Alberta via BC. He arrived in St. Albert in 1873 to join the French settlement and take up farming, later building a store. He married Julie L'Hirondelle and the couple had 5 children. Edmond was also remembered for antagonizing future Prime Minister R.B. Bennett at a political rally.		2015

Chalifoux, Paul	Former Mayor of St. Albert. Paul served as Mayor from 1998 to 2001 and again from 2004 to 2007. He also served as a City Alderman from 1992 to 1998. Paul was born and raised in Morinville, but moved to St. Albert where he was a teacher before becoming vice-principal at St. Albert Catholic High School. If it wasn't politics, then it was sports. In between coaching teams and being on boards of sports organizations, he was director of the St. Albert Chamber of Commerce, and chaired the committee that facilitated the establishment of St. Albert Centre. In 1990, he helped charter the first Rotary Club in the city and he was awarded (with his wife, Margaret), the 1987 Volunteer Citizen of the Year Award.	Reserved for Arterial Road	Dec 2018
Chalifoux, Thelma	Thelma was the first Aboriginal woman and Métis person appointed to the Canadian Senate. Throughout her life, she was a tireless advocate for social justice and women's rights, particularly for indigenous people. She founded the Michif Cultural and Métis Resource Institute in St. Albert with a mission to preserve, protect and promote the Métis culture. She volunteered her time helping with Remembrance day celebrations, National Aboriginal day and the Métis week proclamation.		Dec 2018
Charter, George and Annie	George and Annie came to St. Albert in 1930 to farm. Annie became a popular producer of milk and cream.		2015
Cherot, Emile and Celestine	Were married in France in 1909 and came to Canada in 1911. After working their way to St. Albert they grew market vegetables on 45 acres now within the Edmonton City limits		2015
Cloutier, Joseph and Eglantine	Came to St. Albert in 1906 from Ontario. Farmed for 5 years before moving to Pickardville. Their son Cyrille farmed near Morinville for many years and retired to St. Albert, starting a seniors group		2015
Conlin, Ann	Recognized for her contributions to the arts. Long time volunteer at the museum, Director of Heritage Sites for AHF, and President of the Friends of the Arden Theatre Society.		2015
Courchesne, Edouard	Came to St. Albert from Quebec under the leadership of Father Lacombe. The party travelled by cart, arriving in 1886. Many Courchesne descendants remained in St. Albert.		2015
Courtepatte Le Poteau, Jean Baptiste	Son of an HBC fur trader. Settled on River lot 3 and had a family of nine children with his wife Josephthe.		2015

Crouse, Nolan	Former Mayor of St. Albert. DeBruijn, John	Former Mayor of St. Albert. John was first elected a town Councillor in 1962 and then was appointed interim Mayor in 1965 until the election of Richard Fowler later that year. John continued as Councillor for a few terms after. He also served on the Board of Directors of the Sturgeon Community Hospital. John was also a proud serving member of the Loyal Edmonton Regiment militia, retiring as a lieutenant, but remaining active with the Edmonton Garrison Officers' Club and the Royal Canadian Legion No. 273 in St. Albert	Reserved for Arterial Road	Dec 2018

In 2003, Allen received the Corrections Exemplary Service Award Medal in recognition of his service to the Department. He arrived in St. Albert in 1873 from Kamloops via the Yellowhead Pass. He broke land and grew grain on land between St. Albert and Edmonton and was an early investor in the Sturgeon River Mill. Georges married Nancy Cunningham and had 14 children. The family was good friends with Bishop Vital Grandin and Father Lacombe.		2015
Gairdner, George	Came to Canada in 1867 as an HBC clerk. Moved his family to St. Albert for safety in 1885 from the Riel Rebellion. Later became a teacher at the Bellerose school.	Sounds like Garden Crescent in Grandin. Could be used for new building name, but not street.	2015
Galye, Larry	Larry moved to St. Albert in 1975 and has worked for the City of St. Albert for over 38 years. Gillespie	In 1908 the town built and operated a flour mill on the north side of the Sturgeon River just below Mission Avenue and Mill Drive. It was later sold to Gillespie Flour Mills and destroyed by fire in 1938.		2015
Gillies, Angus and Mary Ann	Angus bought River lots 5 and 6 and married Mary Ann in 1906. The year's supply of hay in the barn was lost twice due to fires caused by lightning strikes. They later moved to Edmonton where Angus worked as an accountant.		2015
Glock, George and Otilie	George and Otilie immigrated from Germany with their 8 year old daughter in 1913. Farmed near Riviere Qui Barre until 1928. Moved and farmed near Villeneuve until retirement in 1935.		2015
