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## **School Report Summary**

The St. Albert RCMP partnership with the St. Albert School Divisions continues to grow and develop. The St. Albert RCMP continue to have positive relationships with school administration as well as students. This year, officers were able to attend the schools in person, and get back into the classrooms to have valuable discussions with students.

The St. Albert CPVS team continued to provide education and awareness to students, parents and community members on a variety of topics this year. Many presentations continued to be offered to all school divisions by the St. Albert RCMP. Some of the topics spoken about during presentations this year were vaping, cannabis, communication, internet safety, bullying, consent and many more.

The St. Albert RCMP continued to be a part of the safety response at all of the schools including participating in Safety Planning and Lockdowns as required. The detachment School Action For Emergencies (SAFE) plans were reviewed and updated, in partnership with the school divisions. In addition to that, General Duty members were given the opportunity to walk through some of the local high schools to increase familiarization.

CPVS members continued to be involved with investigations involving school aged youth. The unit continued regular communication with school administration and worked with the schools and divisions to continue to promote Restorative Justice in such investigations. CPVS also connected with administration on investigations that would have an impact on the larger school community, in order for the schools to ensure appropriate resources were in place to support students after experiencing trauma and/or loss.

The St. Albert CPVS unit regularly contributes to the St. Albert Detachment Annual Performance Plan. Initiatives such as the #9PMRoutine and Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) are valuable crime prevention programs, in which the CPVS unit continues to promote & educate citizens about, in an effort to reduce property crimes in St. Albert. The CPVS unit also introduced new initiatives this year, such as the Mental Health Tool Kits.

The CPVS unit looks forward to a positive end to this school year and as always, we anxiously await the next school year!

## **St. Albert Crime Prevention / Victim Services – Community Policing Unit**

The Community Policing Unit (CPVS) in St. Albert has a multi-duty responsibility model. Officers are part-time School Resource Officers, part time Crime Prevention Officers, and have a variety of other crime reduction duties including summer suppression green space patrols.

### **School Resource Officer Program**

During the school year, each school is assigned a primary contact from the CPVS unit to be their School Resource Officer. Schools were contacted by their School Resource Officer at the beginning of the school year to provide contact information.

#### **The Objectives of these Programs are:**

To build positive relationships with youth while maintaining a safe school environment through:

- Classroom interactions
- Problem solving with youth and staff
- Acting as a resource to the School Administrators
- Providing enforcement/ police investigation when needed

## **Grade 8 Drug Awareness Program**

St. Albert School Resource Officers continued to deliver a two lesson presentation to all grade 8 students this year. The lessons focus on Alcohol, Vaping and Cannabis. This year most lessons were taught in person and Officers were so glad to see the students in the classroom!

## **Grade 6 Drug Awareness Program**

St. Albert RCMP continued the 15-month Pilot Project for Botvin LifeSkills Training (LST) this year. The pilot project was completed on schedule with lots of feedback provided by the facilitators, students and teachers.

The LST curriculum covers three broad topic areas:

- **General social skills** – Students gain skills to meet personal challenges such as communicating clearly, building relationships, conflict resolution, and social skills.
- **Personal self-management skills** – Students develop skills that help them enhance self-esteem, develop problem-solving abilities, reduce stress and anxiety, and manage anger for better mental health.
- **Drug resistance skills** – Students learn skills that help them build effective defenses against pressures to use tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs.

The evaluations are currently with RCMP National Youth Services to determine whether LST will be a program that will continue to be utilized by the RCMP. In the mean time the St. Albert CPVS unit are busy planning for next year, in order to be able to return to a unified presentation facilitated for all grade 6 students in St. Albert.

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# Violence Threat Risk Assessment Training

Violence Threat Risk Assessment (VTRA) continues to be very useful for officers, schools and community partners to assess violent situations or threats of violence.



## Grant MacEwan Student Placement

This year, the Field Placement portion of the Grant MacEwan University's Policing Studies program was cancelled due to ongoing Covid-19 restrictions and uncertainty. Planning continues to move forward to have this program return for the Winter 2022 semester and a candidate has been selected.

## Media

The St. Albert RCMP continues to work with media partners to report the crime trends in the community. Articles on prevention strategies and on the "Good News" policing stories in St. Albert are also released to the media. The Media Team prepares the media releases and complete interviews as required for the detachment.

## Crime Stoppers

The St. Albert CPVS unit participates in the Crime Stoppers Program by receiving and distributing the Crime Stoppers Tips to various units in the detachment, and ensuring that information is reported back to Crime Stoppers at the conclusion of the investigation. The CPVS unit also promotes the program during media releases, to ensure community members have the information they need to report crimes anonymously.

## **St. Albert Camera Registry**

St. Albert RCMP launched the St. Albert Camera Registry in August 2020. The registry is intended to assist with obtaining video surveillance for criminal investigations. Residents and businesses in the community were asked to voluntarily sign up for the registry if they are willing to turn over video footage when requested for an ongoing investigation. The RCMP currently has over 60 locations registered, and the CPVS unit will continue promoting the program this summer.

## **St. Albert Safe Internet Exchange Zone**

Many locations across Alberta have begun to introduce Safe Internet Exchange Zones at local Police Detachments. Locations are open 24/7 for exchange of items purchased off the internet on Kijiji, Facebook buy/sell sites, Marketplace, etc. providing buyers and sellers with the knowledge that the site is under video surveillance.

At the St. Albert RCMP detachment, we do not have the capacity for this initiative in our parking lot so the St. Albert RCMP partnered with the City of St. Albert to have this set up at Servus Place. The site is easily accessible in a less busy area of the parking lot, and has few obstructions, ensuring continuous surveillance. This site can also be used for child custody exchanges.

This initiative was launched May 2021 and feedback from the community on the St. Albert Safe Internet Exchange Zone has been positive.



## **Mental Health Tool Kits**

St. Albert RCMP began a new initiative this year to enhance officer's response to the community. Mental Health Tool Kits are designed to assist in de-escalating persons suffering a mental health crisis, and getting people the help they need in a safe manner.

The kits include items to help with communication, de-escalation, and rapport building, including many sensory items. While the main purpose of these kits is for assisting with mental health calls for service, these kits are great to use for interacting with any clients, not only those experiencing a mental health crisis. The kits were provided to uniformed and plain clothes officers, as well as the St. Albert Victim Services Unit.

## **Victim Services Liaison**

The CPVS unit provides one member as an RCMP Liaison to the St. Albert Victim Services Unit (VSU). The member works closely with VSU to ensure the needs of Victims of Crime and Tragedy are met and that referrals are made from the RCMP to the VSU program. The Liaison member attends VSU board meetings and advocate meetings to provide information to VSU and address any concerns. The St. Albert RCMP continues to have a positive working relationship with St. Albert Victim Services.

## **40 Developmental Assets**

St. Albert RCMP continues to support the 40 Developmental Asset Model and the use of Positive Tickets to reward youth for healthy choices and positive behavior. Positive Tickets are given to local youth by RCMP, Mayor and Council, Public Works, Block Party organizers and Community Social Development. This Crime Reduction Strategy allows youth to use these tickets for free access to city recreation facilities, while building healthy relationships with adults in the community. The redemption of Positive Tickets has been challenging for community members during the pandemic, but the tickets have no expiry so they can be kept by individuals and redeemed when they are able to. Even with many restrictions in place, over 100 positive tickets were redeemed in 2021!



## **Block Party Attendance**

As supported by the Alberta Justice and Solicitor General, and as part of the City of St. Albert Social Master Plan, Block Parties are part the RCMP Crime Reduction strategies.

These events allow Officers to:

- Speak about steps citizens can take to reduce crime in their neighbourhood
- Encourage residents to watch out for each other
- Empower residents to report suspicious people or incidents
- Allow citizens the opportunity to ask officers questions

St. Albert RCMP partners with St. Albert City Neighbourhood Development and St. Albert Neighbourhood Watch to encourage residents to host Block Parties. The past year, block parties still occurred with Covid-19 protocols in place. The CPVS unit attended many of the scheduled block parties and will continue to do so this year.

## **Enhanced Green Space Patrols**

St. Albert CPVS continue to proactively patrol the green spaces in St. Albert from May – October as weather permits. The St. Albert Crime Map (not shown) determines hotspots or crimes trends occurring on or near green spaces in St. Albert, which supports the need for patrols on the trails and in the parks within the community. To provide these enhanced green space patrols, the unit's schedule changes from June until the end of August. These patrols have continued during the pandemic, ensuring safe spaces for all the community. This years patrol locations will be dependant on the activity and events within the community. We encourage community members to engage with members while they are on patrol!
