School Report Summary

The RCMP School/ Youth Program partnership with the 4 School Divisions in St. Albert continues to grow and be productive. The General Duty Officers are visiting schools regularly, DARE is being taught, Grade 8 students are having open discussions with officers about drugs and the School Resource Officers working well at the Junior and High School levels.

2016/ 2017 has been a busy year for the School Resource Officer team as they intervened with bullying, social media issues, thefts, driving complaints and assaults. The partnership between the School Administrators, Counsellors, staff, parents and SRO's allows most cases to be resolved without criminal charges. Drug possession cases continue to be handled in accordance with the St. Albert Drug Free Protocol which allows for consequences to be assigned under the School Act when appropriate.

The implementation of the Violence Threat Risk Assessment (VTRA) model will complement the existing St. Albert School/ RCMP SRO model well. VTRA is based on the principle of working with the student and his family to ensure his success, and areas using this model find that it provides an effective method of dealing with violent behavior while connecting the youth with resources to prevent the problems from reoccurring. Our officers are looking forward to the VTRA training and the implementation of the VTRA model this fall.

The St. Albert RCMP Community Policing/ School Resource Officer Unit has seen some staffing changes this spring. While a part-time Domestic Violence Case Coordinator joined the unit, two officers left as well. One officer transferred to the RCMP Musical Ride in Ottawa, while one took a job as a Detachment File Reviewer. Another officer will be joining the unit at the end of August to become our newest SRO and she is looking forward to teaching DARE and working with the schools and the community.


The CPVS unit was successful in providing some Healthy Relationship presentations to High School C.A.L.M. classes and have been invited to deliver this presentation to the summer school CALM classes as well. CPVS is continuing the Grade 8 Drug Awareness classes and will continue to build strong relationships with the Grade 6 population through the DARE program.




St. Albert Community Policing/ Victim Services Unit

The Community Policing Unit (CP/VS) in St. Albert has a multi-duty responsibility model. Officers are part-time School Resource Officers, part time Crime Prevention officers, as well as having a variety of other community duties. During the summer, they switch to Bike and Cart patrol duties. The following chart represents the responsibilities of the officers in this unit.





Reserve Constable Positions are retired officers who are re-hired by the RCMP to cover vacancies and work on special events. Although the Reserve Constables are sworn in for 3 year periods, they are not permanent employees. The hours for the Reserve Constable program is dependent on budget availability and policing needs.



Auxiliary Constables are community volunteers that are security cleared to work in the RCMP Detachment on crime prevention events and community policing projects.

This program is in place in addition to the work that the DARE officers and the School Resource Officers are doing in the schools. Each General Duty Officer is assigned an Elementary or Junior High School to visit twice per month to get to know the building and its occupants.

Being familiar with the school building, staff and students is an advantage and an operational necessity in the event of a lockdown, threat to the building or if there is a need to evacuate the school for an emergency.

St. Albert RCMP Youth Academy

The St. Albert RCMP Youth Academy is now being held every 2 years. The next Youth Academy is being planned for the spring of 2018 and the School Divisions and School staff are encouraged to help us spread the word about this amazing opportunity.

Grade 8 Drug Awareness Program

The Grade 8 Drug Awareness Program was taught to all Grade 8 classes in the city. The program was adjusted this year to encourage more interaction with the grade 8 students. The first class addressed the effects of marihuana, alcohol and other drugs on the brain and teenage mental health through showing a video, followed by a discussion.

The second class was changed from previous years to an interactive exercise that examines underage drinking, interactions with the police, as well as drinking and driving. This lesson has been very effective in generating discussions and questions between the students and the officer.

The 10 week program that covers Healthy Choices and Life Skills is comprised of 9 classroom lessons and a graduation ceremony. 38 classrooms x 9 (1 hour) lessons = 342 teaching hours plus preparations time and graduation ceremony time.

DARE is a significant RCMP/ School investment towards healthy youth and its primary benefit is the relationship built between the RCMP and St. Albert youth. This proven long-lasting relationship sees students confidently approach their DARE officer now and even years later for advice and guidance. It is common for past DARE students to seek out their DARE officers to introduce new babies or spouses in their families. In many parts of the world, police are not trusted, but are instead feared. St. Albert's investment in the DARE program teaches life skills while building positive, trusting relationships that meet St. Albert's Social Master Plan goals of a thriving, caring, connected St. Albert.

This DARE curriculum that was developed by Dr. Michael Hecht of Penn State University and which is listed on the USA National Repository of Evidence-Based Programs and Practices, meets the 5 main values of the Social Master plan:

- Sense of Community and Connectedness Lesson 9 My Help Network
- Diversity and Inclusion Lesson 8 Bullying
- Social Responsibility and Engagement Lesson 1 Responsibilities and Healthy Choices
- Healthy Lifestyle and Well Being Lesson 2 Drug information for Healthy Decision Making

DARE Officer Training – K Division

Cst. Fraser and Reserve Constable McIntosh taught new DARE officers in the RCMP headquarters this year. This 80 hour training prepares officers to teach at a grade 6 level and to use effective communication techniques to connect with the students. 1 of the new DARE officers will be teaching in St. Albert in the coming year.

Safe School Planning

Cst. Avoine has worked diligently to complete the RCMP Safe School plans, which are accessible to all RCMP. These plans need to be updated yearly to ensure that key holder information is accurate. She has added the new Alexandre Tache building to the SAFE School plans data bank this year, and has updated any changes at local schools.

VTRA Training

St. Albert RCMP has been working with school and community partners to implement the VTRA (Violence Threat Risk Assessment) plan in St. Albert, Sturgeon County and Morinville areas. June 27 and 28, 2017 mark the dates for the Level 1 VTRA training being held at Paul Kane school. Kevin Cameron, the VTRA designer, will be instructing so all partners will get the most up to date information on this threat assessment model.

School Staff Presentations

A presentation was given to Teacher's Aids during Teachers' convention. Two topics were presented which were Fentanyl and Graffiti.

Student Placement

The CPVS unit accepted a Field Placement student from Grant MacEwan University's Policing Studies program this year. This student observed School Resource Officer work in St. Albert schools and gained experience in investigations and in community crime prevention work.

As this student was a past DARE student of one of our officers and since he had also attended Morinville Detachment's Citizen Academy a few years ago, he spoke about the importance of positive relationship building between police officers and our youth. This young person has remained with the CPVS unit as a volunteer that will be involved in future community events.

Crime Free Multi Housing Program

St. Albert RCMP is bringing Crime Free Multi Housing (CFMH) to the city as a way of creating more safety in our condo, seniors and apartment complexes. This program that originated in Arizona, combines CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) principles with other Crime Prevention techniques to reduce crime in these communities. The St. Albert Community Policing Unit will be tasked with conducting the CPTED audits, preparing the Crime Free Multi Housing reports for the building owners and liaising with the building residents to address any concerns that arise.

CFMH inspections have been done at 5 properties in St. Albert and one complex, 10 and 12 Nevada Place have attained their CFMH status.

Asset Development

The St. Albert RCMP continues to support the 40 Developmental Asset Model and the use of Positive tickets to reward youth for healthy choices and positive behavior. Positive tickets are shared with Mayor and Council, Public Works, Block Parties and Community Social Development. Youth who receive these tickets can enjoy free access to city recreation facilities and free bus rides to and from the venue.

Domestic Violence Case Coordinator

In September 2016, St. Albert RCMP implemented a part-time Domestic Violence Case Coordinator. This officer is responsible for reviewing Domestic Violence cases to ensure:

- that all supports are in place for the families
- that safety planning has been completed with them
- that they are supported through the Criminal Justice process
- that Victim Services are connected to the family
- that threat assessments are done when warranted

The Domestic Violence Case Coordinator has reviewed 71 Domestic Violence cases to date. She has also implemented a Court support process at the courthouse with a clear partnership with the Crown Prosecutor.

The Domestic Violence Case Coordinator also sits on the St. Albert Family Violence Awareness and Education Inter-agency Committee that seeks to reduce cases of Family Violence in the city.

Bike and Cart Patrol

St. Albert RCMP have implemented the Police bike and cart schedule again year. The School Resource Officer's schedule changed mid- June to allow for officers to be present in the green spaces and parks on bike and cart patrols between Tuesdays to Saturdays. During these patrols, checks of school properties occur, enforcement and police investigations are undertaken and prevention work is done. While school is still in session, the School Resource Officers continue to be present in the schools, although they may arrive in the cart or on bikes.

St. Albert residents that frequent the trails and park areas regularly comment about how the presence of the officers on bikes and the cart make them feel safe. The officers are also more approachable on these types of transportation and can readily speak to residents need help or advice.
